Creation 4C - Cosmos Peace, Seattle October 6, 2013 Colossians 1:15-20, John 1:1-5, 10-14

WHAT ARE WE HERE FOR?

The dimensions of our own galaxy, the Milky Way, are mind-boggling:

Up to 400,000 billion stars—and perhaps at least as many planets—arranged in a giant spiral disk of stars, dust, and gas measuring 100,000 light-years in diameter.

Our own solar system, arrayed around a single one of those stars, is located, astronomers tell us, in the "outer suburbs" of our galaxy, 27,000 light years from the galaxy center.

To put it in more accessible terms, if our Solar System were the size of a quarter, the Milky Way galaxy would have a diameter of 1,200 miles, an area one-third the size of the United States.¹

<u>Proxima Centauri</u>, our nearest solar neighbor, lies 4¼ light-years—a mere 25 trillion miles—away. And here's the clincher: our Milky Way is but one of perhaps 500 billion galaxies.²

Three years ago two astronomers from Yale and Harvard, using the most up to date data, estimated the number of stars in the universe. Their answer: <u>300 sextillion</u>. That's a 3 followed by 26 zeros.³

One member of the duo, astrophysicist Charlie Conroy, took the number of cells in each human body–50 trillion or so–multiplied that number by the 6 billion people on Earth, and came up with essentially the same number: 300 sextillion.

Roughly speaking, then, he ventured that the number of stars in the universe "is equal to all the cells in the humans on Earth."⁴

And yet, for all this vastness, on both a <u>macro-scale</u> and a <u>micro-scale</u>, we confess to putting our trust in the one Triune God whom we believe is at the source of all of this; who 13.8 billion years after the BIG BANG continues to bring this universe—vast and intricate—into being.

Here we are this Sunday morning, sitting on what Carl Sagan called "this pale blue dot," located in the "outer suburbs" of our home galaxy, and situated within the habitable zone in our planet's orbit around the Sun...

Here we are...and we had nothing to do with getting here!

- Had nothing to do with the cosmic forces that made the emergence of life in the universe a possibility.
- <u>Had nothing to do</u> with the circumstances, infinitesimal by every measure, which led to Earth's formation within the crucial habitable zone around our parent Star—the Sun.
- <u>Had nothing to do</u> with the incredibly long, complex, incredible and beleaguered history of Earth's evolutionary history, which, after hundreds of millions of years of effort, finally saw the emergence of intelligent life.
- We had nothing to do with the fact that we are...and yet, here we are!

So, my friends, my fellow and sister Earthlings, the question is: WHAT ARE WE HERE FOR?
