+ GATHERING +

WELCOME! During <u>Season of Creation: TREES</u> we're exploring the connection between forest ecology, human ecology, and our Christian faith.

Ancestors of modern trees began appearing on Earth about 385 million years ago. Over the millennia complex relationships have evolved within and between various tree species, their root systems, the microscopic fungal and bacterial network that inhabits the humus at their feet—as well with the creatures, great and small, with whom they have slowly built alliances through time. Across millions of generations, trees have contributed significantly to the process by which Earth became a habitable planet—a role they continue to play today.

Research into forest ecology in recent decades has made some startling discoveries: that trees living in community (we call them forests) communicate with one another, tend their young, share resources, respond to the needs of weakened members, enrich the livability of the places where they reside, sequester carbon, provide the oxygen we breathe, time the dispersal of their seed-progeny to maximize distribution, budget their strength and energy economically, and have well developed methods for healing themselves and fending off invaders.¹

For thousands of years human cultures around the world have recognized the sacred nature of trees and have employed them as symbols of the Divine. In the Scriptures, the Tree of Life is a metaphor for the mysterious, primordial Garden from which humankind emerged (Genesis 1-2) and toward which God's mission of wholeness and healing is leading us (Revelation 22). The Tree of the Cross is the axis through which Earth and Heaven, God and Humankind, are reunited through the outpoured love of the Creator in and through Jesus, whose incarnation opens our eyes once more to the sacred nature of Earth which, like a Mother, nurtures and sustains all living things.

During these three weeks we're paying attention to the trees we encounter each day around our homes, in your neighborhoods and parks—and we invite you to join us! Let's learn together more of what trees and forests have to teach us about living in community and enhancing the livability of the places where we live. Let's get outside and use the <u>Tree</u> <u>Walking Guides</u> provided by the City of Seattle Park Department (available on the Peace website) to view specific species of trees "in person' in West Seattle parks and neighborhoods; let's humbly open ourselves to what we might learn.

Our PASS THE HAT MINISTRY this month is <u>Earth Ministry</u>. A video highlighting Earth Ministry's role as a "moral compass" is included in today's Live Stream.

In WEEK TWO we'll be joined by Lynda Mapes, author of <u>Witness Tree: Seasons of</u> <u>Change with a Century Old Oak</u>. Then, in WEEK THREE, look for a special performance of <u>The Tree</u>, an original song composed by Dana Lyons arranged and produced by Bronwyn Edwards for virtual choir. In addition, Kjerstyn Lindgren, niece of Kevin and Nicole Klinemeier and graduate of Evergreen State University, will lead an adult forum on tips for moving toward a <u>zero-waste</u> lifestyle.

PRELUDE

CALL TO WORSHIP

Julie, Ben, and Will Ward lead the Call to Worship from the foot of a tree in Lincoln Park. Crush and rub a sprig of cedar or rosemary between your fingers and take in the aroma. Cedar is a sacred tree in this part of the world. Rosemary is a symbol of remembrance.

- L Come, Creator, Mother and Father of all, come unite with Earth community around the sacred tree of life, and help us remember anew: The first fresh breath of life, the first hint of your presence, the first song in the dawn that opened our souls to you and taught us to celebrate.

- L Come, compassionate Christ, come unite with all creation around the ancient tree of healing, and help us remember: The pains you feel among the suffering poor, the hurts you feel when Earth is wounded, the touch of your healing hands not only for the few long ago, but for all creations on Earth and for Earth.
- C Come, help us remember!
- L Come, Spirit of life and breath, come unite with all that inhales oxygen from the first trees of life, and help us remember our breath: Our life from God, the first breath, our life through the trees of Earth, our life through the risen Christ, so that we may become agents of life as we breathe with all creation.
- C Come, help us remember!

PRAYER OF THE DAY

- P The Creator be with you.
- C And also with you.
- P Let us pray. Creator God,
- C Today we come together to be grounded—as trees are grounded in nourishing soil—in your creation and in your grace. Show us your presence in the forests that surround us, that we may see the communities they foster above and below the soil. Teach us to live our lives with loving intention, recognizing our relatedness to all living things. In the name of Christ, through whom all things are reconciled, whether on Earth or in heaven. Amen.

CONFESSION

Our confession this season is framed by words from <u>Laudato Si'</u>, the circular letter from Pope Francis which invites all people into renewed care for our common home.

- P In his beautiful canticle, Saint Francis of Assisi reminds us that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us. This sister now cries out to us because of the harm we have inflicted on her by our irresponsible use and abuse of the goods with which God has endowed her.
- C We have come to see ourselves as her lords and masters, entitled to plunder her at will. The violence present in our hearts, wounded by sin, is reflected in the symptoms of sickness evident in the soil, in the water, in the air, and in all forms of life.
- P The Earth herself, burdened and laid waste, is among the most abandoned and maltreated of our poor; she "groans in travail."
- C We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the Earth; that our very bodies are made up of her elements: we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters. Forgive our forgetfulness, O God, and give us the will to treat our sister with respect, care, and gratitude.

+ WORD +

READING: Ezekiel 17:22-24

In chapter 17, Ezekiel lays out the case for both judgement and hope. The first allegory (vs. 1-10) speaks of the divine judgement upon Israel's king, as evidenced by the Babylonian invasion. The second (vs. 22-24) speaks of God's intention to raise up a new leader, like a noble cedar.

Thus says the Lord God:

I myself will take a sprig from the lofty top of a cedar; I will set it out. I will break off a tender one from the topmost of its young twigs; I myself will plant it on a high and lofty mountain. On the mountain height of Israel I will plant it, in order that it may produce boughs and bear fruit, and become a noble cedar. Under it every kind of bird will live; in the shade of its branches will nest winged creatures of every kind. All the trees of the field shall know that I am the Lord. I bring low the high tree, I make high the low tree; I dry up the green tree and make the dry tree flourish. I the Lord have spoken; I will accomplish it.
