In many ecumenical circles, the Feast of St. Francis also marks the end of an international Season of Creation. As we mark St. Francis Sunday this year, we are particularly mindful of the impact climate breakdown is having on the communities of color and places where the world's poorest citizens live.





- C We have forgotten that we ourselves are dust of the earth; that our very bodies are made up of her elements: we breathe her air and we receive life and refreshment from her waters. Turn us from violent and self-serving ways. Give us the will to treat our sister with respect, care, and gratitude. Create in us new and clean hearts!

Tomorrow is World Habitat Day and according to the USDA, you can create habitat for overwintering pollinators, reduce greenhouse gasses *and* benefit your garden by leaving your leaves this Fall. The caterpillars need those leaves. The birds need the caterpillars. And we need them both! Fallen leaves also create a natural mulch, helping suppress weeds while fertilizing the soil as they break down. LUNCH WITH NEW CONFIRMATION COHORT OCTOBER 8

On Sunday noon to 1pm - Those who are new to confirmation will have a lunch and orientation after worship.

OCTOBER 15, PASS THE HAT: MDC

(Maji Development Coalition) with guest Carolyn Kurtz, Executive Director. Carolyn writes: "Thank you for the support you have given to the people of Maji, in remote Ethiopia. MDC had a great year, full of successes, as supply chains and other hurdles got sorted out. We distributed 500 more solar lanterns to children in the poorest homes. They will have light to do their homework, but their whole families will also benefit from having light in the home at night. And our huge, ambitious project--bringing safe water to 2000 people in several rural communities--is operational as of September. This will save people from debilitating waterborne diseases, especially children and the elderly. The new gravity-fed system will also save the backs of women, who have had to hike steep trails to bring water back for family use. As Ato Markos, our program director said, "MDC is like a miracle to us!" In the coming year we will focus on the women's co-ops, and join with the local church to develop for a Women's Empowerment Center in Maji town.
