Welcome to all who gather this day to mark Ash Wednesday and the beginning of the season of Lent. Your presence enriches our community.

If you are joining us via Live Stream, please find and light a candle as worship begins, or keep a small bit of earth handy for the

Imposition of Ashes later in the service.

For the next five Wednesdays in Lent we will gather at Peace for a simple soup supper @ 6pm, followed by a half-hour service of Evening Prayer at 7pm.



We celebrate Christ's presence in the Sacrament of the Table this night. Christ, our Host, meets us in this meal of grace and offers himself, fully embodied, in the bread and wine. He invites all to come and meet him in this Holy Meal.



ON ASH WEDNESDAY we begin our forty-day journey with Christ toward the cross and empty tomb. Marking our foreheads with ash, we acknowledge that we are destined to die and return to the Earth. At the same time, the ash traces the life-giving cross indelibly marked on our foreheads at baptism. While we journey together through this season, our relationship with God through the covenant of baptism is renewed. Returning to our baptismal call, we are set free to more intentionally bear the fruits of mercy and justice in the world.

## **FIRST READING: Joel 2:1-2, 12-17**

Because of the coming Day of the Lord, the prophet Joel calls the people to a community lament. The repentant community reminds God of his gracious character and asks God to spare the people, lest the nations doubt God's power to save.

Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the LORD is coming, it is near-- <sup>2</sup>a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come.

<sup>12</sup>Yet even now, says the LORD, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; <sup>13</sup>rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing.

<sup>14</sup>Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the LORD, your God? <sup>15</sup>Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; <sup>16</sup>gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy.

<sup>17</sup>Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the LORD, weep. Let them say, "Spare your people, O LORD, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations. Why should it be said among the peoples, 'Where is their God?' "

## **PSALM 51:1-17** Read responsively from PSALMS ANEW

<sup>1</sup>In your goodness, O God, have mercy on me;

With gentleness wipe away my faults.

<sup>2</sup>Cleanse me of guilt; free me from my sins.

<sup>3</sup>My faults are always before me; my sins haunt my mind.

<sup>4</sup>I have sinned against you and no other-knowing that my actions were wrong in your eyes. Your judgement is what I deserve; your sentence supremely fair.

<sup>5</sup>As you know I was born in guilt, from conception a sinner at heart.

<sup>6</sup>But you love true sincerity, so you teach me the depths of wisdom.

<sup>7</sup>Until I am clean, bathe me with hyssop; wash me until I am whiter than snow.

<sup>8</sup>Infuse me with joy and gladness; let these bones you have crushed dance with joy. <sup>9</sup>Please do not stare at my sins; blot out all my guilt.

<sup>10</sup>Create a pure heart in me, O my God; renew me with a steadfast spirit.

<sup>11</sup>Don't drive me away from your presence, or take your Holy Spirit from me.

<sup>12</sup>Once more be my savior; revive my joy.

Strengthen and sharpen my still weak spirit.

<sup>13</sup>And I will teach transgressors your ways; then sinners will return to you, too.

<sup>14</sup>Release me from death, God my Savior, and I will announce your justice.

<sup>15</sup>Open my lips, and my tongue will proclaim your glory.

<sup>16</sup>Sacrifices give you no pleasure; if I offered a holocaust, you would refuse it.

<sup>17</sup>My sacrifice is this broken spirit. You will not disdain a contrite and humbled heart.

## READING: 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10


The ministry of the gospel endures many challenges and hardships. Through this ministry, God's reconciling activity in the earth of Christ reaches into the depths of our lives to bring us into a right relationship with God. In this way, God accepts us into the reality of divine salvation.

We entreat you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. <sup>21</sup>For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God. <sup>6:1</sup>As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. <sup>2</sup>For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you, and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation!

<sup>3</sup>We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no fault may be found with our ministry, <sup>4</sup>but as servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, <sup>5</sup>beatings, imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; <sup>6</sup>by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, <sup>7</sup>truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; <sup>8</sup>in honor and dishonor, in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; <sup>9</sup>as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; <sup>10</sup>as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

### **GOSPEL: Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21**

In the sermon on the Mount, Jesus commends almsgiving, prayer, and fasting, but emphasizes that spiritual devotion must not be done for show.

<sup>1</sup>[Jesus said to the disciples:] "Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen by them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven. <sup>2</sup>So whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. <sup>3</sup>But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, <sup>4</sup>so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

5"And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for they love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they may be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. <sup>6</sup>But whenever you pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

<sup>16</sup> And whenever you fast, do not look dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that they are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. <sup>17</sup>But when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, <sup>18</sup>so that your fasting may be seen not by others but by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward you.

<sup>19</sup>"Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal; <sup>20</sup>but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. <sup>21</sup>For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."



### INVITATION TO LENT

P Friends in Christ, today with the whole church we enter the time of remembering Jesus' passover from death to life, and our life in Christ is renewed.

We begin this holy season by acknowledging our need for repentance and for God's mercy. We are created to experience joy in communion with God, to love one another, and to live in harmony with creation. But our sinful rebellion separates us from God, our neighbors, and creation, so that we do not enjoy the life our creator intended.

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to a discipline that contends against evil and resists whatever leads us away from love of God and neighbor. I invite you, therefore, to the discipline of Lent—self-examination and repentance, prayer and fasting, sacrificial giving and works of love—strengthened by the gifts of word and sacrament. Let us continue our journey through these forty days to the great Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection.

#### **CONFESSION OF SIN**

P Let us confess our sin in the presence of God and of one another.

Silence is kept.

- P Most holy and merciful God,
- C we confess to you and to one another, and before the whole company of heaven, that we have sinned by our fault, by our own fault, by our own most grievous fault, in thought, word, and deed, by what we have done and by what we have left undone.
- P We have not loved you with our whole heart, and mind, and strength.We have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.We have not forgiven others as we have been forgiven.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- P We have shut our ears to your call to serve as Christ served us. We have not been true to the mind of Christ. We have grieved your Holy Spirit.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- P Our past unfaithfulness, the pride, envy, hypocrisy, and apathy that have infected our lives, we confess to you.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- P Our self-indulgent appetites and ways, and our exploitation of other people, we confess to you.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- P Our negligence in prayer and worship, and our failure to share the faith that is in us, we confess to you.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- P Our neglect of human need and suffering, and our indifference to injustice and cruelty, we confess to you.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.


- P Our false judgments, our uncharitable thoughts toward our neighbors, and our prejudice and contempt toward those who differ from us, we confess to you.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- P Our waste and pollution of your creation, and our lack of concern for those who come after us, we confess to you.
- C Have mercy on us, O God.
- P Restore us, O God, and let your anger depart from us.
- C Hear us, O God, for your mercy is great.

#### **IMPOSITION OF ASHES**

- P Almighty and Altender God, you have created us out of the dust of the Earth. May these ashes be a sign of our mortality and penitence, reminding us that only by the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ are we given eternal life; through the same Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.
- C Amen.

#### LORD'S PRAYER


- P Lord, renew in us your kingdom and teach us to pray:

#### POST-COMMUNION PRAYER



## THIS WEEK'S ACT FOR CREATION

This year, our Creation Care Action Plan included a focus on combating plastics pollution by reducing how much we individually use. To help us all do that, we invite you to accept our *Replacing Plastics For Lent Challenge*. Every week starting today, we'll share an activity to help your household use fewer plastics and seek more sustainable alternatives. Please join us!

**Assess.** The first step in using fewer plastics is to evaluate your plastic usage. Since most plastics are single-use packaging and only about 5% of the plastic we put in the recycling is actually recycled, it's important to understand just how much we use individually. This week, set aside every piece of plastic you would normally throw away or put in recycling in a separate place. At the end of the week take 2 minutes to look through your plastic use to get an idea of what habits are leading to your plastic consumption. Make a note of which categories contribute the most to your plastic waste.

**Pray for Creation:** When we are discouraged by actions that damage our world, we ask God to rekindle our energies and our talents to support the sustainability of the cosmos.

# LENT WEDNESDAYS

The season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday service on February 14 @ 7pm. Our Lenten Wednesday evening prayer services, following the soup suppers, commence on February 21. This year we'll be exploring the Psalms of lament and reflecting on how our society and world have been in an almost continuous state of lament in recent years. We'll seek better understanding of the role of lament within the Hebrew tradition and how it can be used constructively today. Many hands make light work! You are invited to assist with soup suppers before Wednesday evening services during Lent. You may offer to set tables, make a soup, bring bread/crackers, or clean up. On Sunday, a sign-up sheet will be found on the table in the narthex.
