TO JOIN THE PROCESSION:

Get a palm branch and meet us on the westside patio. Those who prefer to be seated may find a place in the sanctuary.



This week, the center of the church's year, is one of striking contrasts: Jesus rides into Jerusalem surrounded by shouts of glory, only to be left alone to die on the cross, abandoned by even his closest friends. Mark's gospel presents Jesus in his complete human vulnerability: agitated, grieved, scared, forsaken. Though we lament Christ's suffering and all human suffering, we also expect God's salvation: in the wine and bread, Jesus promises that his death will mark a new covenant with all people. We enter this holy week thirsty for the completion of God's astonishing work.

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ABOUT THE PALM BRANCHES

The palm branches we use are sourced from ECO-PALMS, a project allied with the University of Minnesota Center for Integrated Natural Resources and Agricultural Management. You can read more about them on the announcement page below. Following the service, you may take your palm branch home or place it in one of the brass urns.

WELCOME We gather on the westside patio for the procession.

Children are welcome to play a rhythm instrument during the procession.

THE PROCESSION WITH PALMS At every "Hosannah!" lift your branches high.

- P Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.
- C Hosanna in the highest!
- P The holy gospel according to St. Mark, the 11th Chapter. When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them,
- C "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'"
- P They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,
- C "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"
- P Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve. The gospel of the Lord.
- C Praise to you, O Christ.
- P Let us pray. We praise you, O God, for redeeming the world through our Savior Jesus Christ. Today he entered the holy city in triumph and was proclaimed Messiah and king by those who spread garments and branches along his way. Grant us grace to follow our Lord in the way of the cross, so that, joined to his death and resurrection, we enter into life with you; through the same Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, now and forever.
- C Amen.

Lift your branches high as the procession begins.

- P Let us go forth in peace.
- C In the name of Christ! Amen!


Follow the procession from the westside patio, up Thistle Street, to the double doors of the nave.

At the doors to the nave, join in the final exchange.

- P Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!
- C Hosanna to the Son of David!

Follow the procession into the nave as we sing All Glory, Laud, and Honor.

FIRST READING: Isaiah 50:4-9a

The servant of the Lord expresses absolute confidence in his final vindication, despite the fact that he has been struck and spit upon. This characteristic of the servant played an important role in the early church's understanding of the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

⁴The Lord GOD has given me the tongue of a teacher,

that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word.

Morning by morning he wakens—wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught.

⁵The Lord GOD has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backward.

⁶I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting.

⁷The Lord GOD helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced;

therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame;

⁸he who vindicates me is near.

Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together.

Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me.

⁹It is the Lord GOD who helps me; who will declare me guilty?

PSALM 31:9-16 Congregation joins choir on each refrain.



- 1. In you, O Lord I take refuge; let me never be put to shame.
 In your justice rescue me, oh my faithful Lord, in your hands I commend my spirit.
- 2. For all my foes reproach me; all my friends are now put to flight. I am forgotten, like the unremembered dead, like a dish that now is broken.
- 3. I place my trust in you, Lord; in your hands is my destiny. Let your face shine upon your servant, Lord, in your hands I will place my life.

SECOND READING: Philippians 2:5-11

Paul uses an early Christian hymn to help us comprehend Jesus' obedient selflessness on the cross and how God has made Christ lord over all reality. The perspective of the cross becomes the way we rightly understand God, Christ, our own lives, and fellowship within the community of Christ.

Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

⁶who, though he was in the form of God,

did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited,

⁷but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form, 8he humbled himself

and became obedient to the point of death-even death on a cross.

⁹Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name,

¹⁰so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend,

in heaven and on earth and under the earth,

¹¹and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

+ THE PASSION OF OUR LORD ACCORDING TO MARK +

Readers tell the story of Christ's passion, beginning with his anointing by a woman disciple in Bethany, the Passover meal he shares with his disciple community, his arrest at Gethsemane, his trial before the Sanhedrin and before Pontius Pilate, and his crucifixion at the place called Golgotha. My song is love unknown, my Savior's love to me, love to the loveless shown that they might lovely be. Oh, who am I that for my sake my Lord should take frail flesh and die?

MARK 14:1-31 Response: My Song Is Love Unknown, verse 2

He came from his blest throne salvation to bestow; the world that was his own would not its Savior know. But, oh, my friend, my friend indeed, who at my need his life did spend!

MARK 14:32-72 Response: My Song Is Love Unknown, verse 3

Sometimes we strew his way and his sweet praises sing; resounding all the day hosannas to our king. Then "Crucify!" is all our breath, and for his death we thirst and cry.

MARK 15:1-39 Response: My Song Is Love Unknown, verse 4

We cry out, we will have our dear Lord made away, a murderer to save, the prince of life to slay. Yet cheerful he to suff'ring goes that he his foes from thence might free.

MARK 15:40-47 Response: My Song Is Love Unknown, verses 5 and 6







EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

- C All glory and honor is yours, O God, Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer of all, in your holy Church, now and forever. Amen.


LORD'S PRAYER Traditional

ABOUT THE PALM BRANCHES

The palm branches used today are sourced from ECO-PALMS, a project allied with the University of Minnesota Center for Integrated Natural Resources and Agricultural Management. Working together with the Rainforest Alliance TREES program and Smartwood, this program certifies palms harvested

from the forests of Mexico and Guatemala for sale to Christian congregations in the United States and Europe. Harvesting palms is an important source of income for families. Gatherers receive a higher price for "fair trade" palms, improving their income. Palms protect valuable natural forests because they provide income to forest communities. The sustainable harvesting and management of palms protects palms and the forests they need for shade and improves the income and living conditions for the communities gathering the palms.
